## LIFE IN THE CHURCH

Teach Your Children Well — Deuteronomy 6:1-9 October 14, 2018

And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.

- Deuteronomy 6:6-7

### I. KNOWING, DOING, AND REMEMBERING

- God's teachings (commandments) are to be known, acted upon, and remembered. None of these are possible without teaching (Deut. 4:9; Ps. 78:5; Matt. 28:20).
- Obedience to God arises primarily from a holy fear (Gen. 22:12; Ex. 20:20; Job 1:1; Ps. 34:11; Prov. 1:7; Eccl.12:13; Acts 19:17;
- 1 Peter 2:17).
- Learning comes with repetition and reinforcement (Deut. 6:7-8; 11:19).
- The goal of the ancient creeds and confessions: clarification, teaching, quick recall.

#### II. THE DUTY OF CHRISTIAN PARENTING

- To train themselves in godly living (Ps. 119:10; Jer. 29:13; 2 Tim. 3:15-17; Eph. 4:11-16).
- To model a Christian marriage (Eph. 5:22-33).
- To seek the good of their children (1 Sam. 1:20-22; Heb. 12:5-11; Matt. 7:9-12; Eph. 6:4).
- To train their children (Deut. 6:1-9; 2 Tim. 1:5).

F - Frame the day M - Memorize Scripture/creeds/poer
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I - Instruct I - Inform

F - Fun activity N - Navigate troubling issues

T - Train in godliness U - Utilize resources

E - Encourage T - Test

E - Equip E - Empower (through prayer)

N - Nullify poor teaching S - Summarize (Scripture, teaching)

**KNOW**: One of the primary responsibilities of Christian parents is to train their children in the faith. To teach others, one must also be trained. To pass the primary education of our children in matters of faith on to others is a dangerous proposition.

**DO**: Be diligent in the task of training your children.
