

The Fellowship of Faith Philemon 4-7 November 10, 2019

...and I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective for the full knowledge of every good thing that is in us for the sake of Christ. - **Philemon 6**

I. PAUL - THE APOSTLE OF PRAYER

- Paul is genuinely thankful for Philemon. This is not a one-sided relationship. He has gained much from his friendship and partnership with him (vss. 5, 7).
- Paul does not just ask for prayer, he also prays. He tells people how he is praying for them. His prayers are theologically rich, and virtually devoid of asking for health, wealth or peace for his friends (vss. 4-6; 1 Cor. 1:4-9; Eph. 1:15-23; Phil. 1:9-11; Col. 1:9-14).
- Paul loves to hear that those he has led to Christ have become active in the faith (vss. 5, 7; Eph. 1:15; Phil. 1:3-7; 1 Thess. 1:2-10; 2 Thess. 1:4; 2 Tim. 1:5).

II. PHILEMON - HE WHO REFRESHES THE SAINTS

- Philemon's love and faith toward Christ is real.
- Philemon's love and faith for the saints is real.
- Philemon has turned his love and faith into work for the Lord.
- Philemon's love, faith and work have created much joy and comfort for Paul.

III. AN ACTIVE FAITH = A STRONG FAITH

- Paul prays that Philemon's mutual participation in the faith with others will lead him to a greater understanding of the faith, and a desire to put it into practice (vs. 6).
- By doing this, Philemon will be a stronger, more faithful believer and the community to which he belongs will benefit. All for the sake of Christ (1 Tim. 4:6-10; James 1:2-4).

KNOW: Our active participation in the faith grows deep roots into that faith. The more we engage, the stronger we become.

DO: Put your faith in Christ into practice. Lay deep and abiding roots.
