

Creation Redux Genesis 2:4-17 February 2, 2020

These are the generations of the heavens and the earth when they were created, in the day that the LORD God made the earth and the heavens. - Genesis 2:4

I. THE TOLEDOT CYCLE

- The refrain "these are the generations" (Heb. *toledot*) starts a ten-part cycle through Genesis. The word has a wider sense of "history," and in Genesis introduces a new stage in the narrative (Gen. 2:4; 5:1; 6:9; 10:1; 11:10, 27; 25:12, 19; 36:1; 37:2).
- These events take place in the "day" the earth and heavens were made (vs. 4).
- In Genesis 1 mankind was the climax. In Genesis 2, mankind is the central point. Everything is awaiting his arrival (vs. 5).

II. MAN AND THE GARDEN

- The picture narrows. God spoke humankind into being, but he also actively "sculpted" the male 'adam from the earth (Gen. 1:26-27; 2:7).
- In the old creation, God breathes life into man. In the new, Jesus breathes life into the church (Gen. 2:7; John 20:22).
- As humans created in God's image, we are body and soul.
- The Garden was made for man and woman. It was "planted" by God and nurtured by elements he had created.
- In this Garden God has planted trees. Two trees are singled out. One brings life, the other knowledge that is forbidden and, although pleasing to the eye, is deadly (vs. 9; 3:6).
- Adam is given responsibility and positive and negative commands eat of every tree, except one (vs. 15-17).
- The positive commands bring health and life, the negative command forewarns of a great curse (Gen. 2:15-17; 3:4, 19).

KNOW: God established man in a fertile world and gave him everything he needed to thrive, to work, and to worship. There was an intentionality in the creation of humankind that eclipsed all other aspects of his creation.

DO: Submit to the Lordship of Christ in your life. He is your Creator.
