DESCENT A STUDY OF GENESIS 4-11

The Flood Genesis 7:1-24 May 17, 2020

They went into the ark with Noah, two and two of all flesh in which there was the breath of life. And those that entered, male and female of all flesh, went in as God had commanded him. And the LORD shut him in.

- Genesis 7:15-16

I. THE RAIN CAME DOWN AND THE FLOOD CAME UP

- Noah's righteousness is reaffirmed by God's own statement, and his obedience is again underscored (7:1, 5; cf. 6:9).
- God now gives more detail to his call to Noah. Many types and varieties of animals will come to him, both clean and unclean (Vss. 2-5).
- Seven final days before the judgment are allowed. Future displays of 7 in relation to judgment may harken back to this first closing of the day of God's grace (Vs. 10; Dan. 9:27; Matt. 18:21-22; Luke 17:4; Heb. 11:30; Rev. 8).
- Rain fell and "all the fountains of the great deep burst forth, until the mountains were covered (Vs. 20).
- The verdict is incontestable: no part of the sinful world could remain. And so it was (Gen. 6:7, 6:13, 6:17; 7:4, 7:21-23).
- The precise dating recorded, with its lack of obvious symbolism, bears the mark of a plain factual account well remembered (7:11; 8:13-14).
- There are no biblical or historical reasons to doubt the veracity of the flood narrative as it stands (Matt. 24:36-39; Heb. 11:7; 1 Peter 3:18-20; 2 Peter 2:5).

II. SHUT IN BY THE GRACE OF GOD

- God initiates the final act of grace prior to the outpouring of his wrath. Noah and his family are shut into the ark (Vs. 16).
- As the floods and rains raged, Noah and his family were safe from the storm (Ps. 46:1-3; Matt. 7:24-27).
- As Noah and his family were hidden in the ark, so God invites us to hide our lives in Christ (Col. 3:1-17).

KNOW: God saves through judgment. Humankind is rightfully blotted out, but not without hope for a future.

DO: Be shut in to the grace of God.
