JOSHUA: presence courage action.

Establishing Order in the Land - Joshua 20:1-21:45 May 14, 2017

Not one word of all the good promises that the LORD had made to the house of Israel had failed; all came to pass.

- Joshua 21:45

I. A HOME FOR THE LEVITES (21:1-42)

- The Levites had been set apart by God for consecrated work based upon their obedience and passion for God and his holiness (Ex. 32:25-29).
- Joshua and Eleazar make good on the command of God through Moses (Num. 35:1-3; Josh. 13:14; 18:7).
- The distribution is broken down according to Levi's three sons Gershon, Kohath, and Merari 48 cities in all (21:41; Gen. 46:11).
- God scatters his priests to judge sin and offer grace throughout the land of Israel (Gen. 49:5-7).

II. THE CITIES OF REFUGE (20:1-9)

- God provides sanctuary cities so that justice will not be miscarried in the land. They are distributed amongst the Levitical towns (Num. 35:6-34; Deut. 19:1-13).
- The cities of refuge:
 - 1. Were distributed so that they were accessible.
 - 2. Were of no help to a genuine murderer.
 - 3. Were to save the innocent from the Kinsman-redeemer.
 - 4. Were available to all, not just Israelites (vs. 9).
 - 5. Were to be doubled if Israel expanded (Deut. 19:8-10).
 - 6. Were of no help to those who refused to flee.
 - 7. Were of no help to those who left their refuge.
- Jesus is our city of refuge (Heb. 6:13-20).
- Order, mercy and justice matter to God (Deut. 16:19-21; Micah 6:8; Matt. 23:23; 1 Cor. 14:33).

III. NOT ONE PROMISE FAILED (21:43-45)

• God is faithful, just, and orderly. His promises never fail. We are called to reflect his nature and his glory (2 Cor. 1:20; Eph. 5:1).

KNOW: Order, justice, and mercy matter to God. We are called to live rightly in this world.

DO: Be imitators of God in justice, mercy, and order.
