

The Worst of Times Ruth 1:1-18 August 2, 2015

In the days when the judges ruled there was a famine in the land, and a man of Bethlehem in Judah went to sojourn in the country of Moab... -Ruth 1:1

I. ISRAEL IN THE TIME OF THE JUDGES

- A time when "everyone did what was right in their own eyes" (Judges 17:6; 21:25).
- A time of distress and testing, when a cycle of rebellion, judgment, cries for mercy, and deliverance was the order of the day (Judges 3:7-11).
- Judges 17-21 demonstrate that the Israelites had comprehensively lost their way and were now no better than the nations they had displaced in the Promised Land.

II. A WANDERING FAMILY

- Elimelech (God is my King) left Bethlehem (the house of bread) for a pagan land because there was no food in Judah (vs. 1).
- In Moab they found food, but they did not find rest or peace (vss. 3-5).

III. A RETURN TO THE LAND OF PROMISE

• Naomi returns to Judah not out of conviction, but because Judah has now received God's blessing. Her loyalty is weak, but Ruth's is strong (vss. 15-17).

IV. REDEMPTIVE HISTORY IN THE MAKING

• In spite of the sin, hardships, judgment and emotional pain, God has been at work in the life of Naomi and in His plan of redemption (Ruth 4:17; Micah 5:2-3; Matt. 1:1-16).

KNOW: God is always working out his sovereign plan. That plan includes you, and it may include some hardships—but even our emptying is under God's gracious control.

DO: Trust in the work of God in your life.

Questions/Discovery Points for Life Groups/Families

Please read Ruth 1:1-18

- 1. What do you feel when you read (or hear) Ruth chapter one? Sorrow? Anger? Pity? What theme is the author developing?
- 2. What kind of people were Elimelech and Naomi? God-fearers? Were they teaching their children well? What do their actions tell us about their relationship with God?
- 3. Naomi doesn't seem to want her daughters-in-law with her as she returns to Israel. Why? Anything we can learn from this in relation to ways in which we try to hide our own sin?
- 4. Bad things happen to good people. Bad things also happen to Christian people. Why?
- 5. Ruth shows incredible loyalty to Naomi. Why is it, do you think, that this type of loyalty is so uncommon in our world today?
- 6. As you look back at verses 1-18, what theme is the author developing?
