Jonah 4
August 4, 2019

And should not I pity Nineveh, that great city, in which there are more than 120,000 persons who do not know their right hand from their left, and also much cattle? -Jonah 4:11

I. THE BOOK OF JONAH

- Jonah can be broken down succinctly like this:

Chapter One: Jonah Running - nothing interrupts the sovereign will of God (1:4, 1:7; 1:17).

Chapter Two: Jonah Repenting - salvation comes from the Lord (2:1; 2:9-10).

Chapter Three: Jonah Returning - God is a God of second chances (3:2; 3:4; 3:6; 3:10).

Chapter Four: Jonah Reprimanding - as Jeremiah is known as the “weeping prophet,” Jonah may properly be known as the “whining prophet” (4:1-4; 4:8-9).

II. LEARNING TO CARE

- God cares for some people that we do not care about (Ex. 22:21-23; Ruth 4:13-14; Eze. 33:11; Eph. 2:11-18).
- Even in places where sin and iniquity abound, innocent lives exist (Jonah 4:11).
- One of our goals as Christ-imitators is to develop a heart that cares for people who are created in God’s image (Mark 6:30-34)

III. GOING AND DOING

- Jonah, after much reluctance, went and did what God called him to do. The results were God’s, not Jonah’s (Jonah 3:6-9).
- Ministry can be very complicated and “ugly” sometimes. It is rarely what we anticipate it to be (2 Cor. 11:22-33).
- A willingness to serve is necessary, not a truck-load of gifts to offer (2 Cor. 8:11-12).

KNOW: God will not be left without a witness to those whom he desires to save. We may be the means by which many...or one, will come to know Christ.

DO: Go with the gospel message.
