LIFE IN THE CHURCH

Once for All — Jude 1-7 September 30, 2018

...although I was very eager to write to you about our common salvation, I found it necessary to write appealing to you to contend for the faith that was once for all delivered to the saints. - Jude 3

I. THE LETTER JUDE DID NOT WRITE

- Jude was most likely the half-brother of Jesus and the full brother of James, leader of the Jerusalem church (vs. 1; Matt. 13:55; John 7:1-9; Acts 1:14).
- He writes to the called, loved by God and kept in Jesus Christ; such will be his letter's theme (vs. 1).
- Jude's original desire was to write a letter rejoicing in their common faith, but that, by necessity, had to change (vs. 3).

II. THE LETTER JUDE DID WRITE

- Due to new circumstances in the churches, Jude must now change the purpose of his letter and charge his hearers to hold fast to the faith (vs. 3; 1 Tim. 4:1-5; 2 Tim. 4:1-5; 2 Pet. 2:1-22).
- Jude provides for his hearers their own graphic history as an object lesson (Numbers 13-14; 1 Cor. 10:1-13; Heb. 3:16-19).
- The Jesus who saved his people out of Egypt is the same Jesus to whom Jude's hearers must turn (vs. 5).
- Angelic rebellions and Sodom and Gomorrah continue to serve as examples to God's people, in Jude's day and in our day (vs. 7).

III. THE BELIEVER'S RESPONSE

- Build yourself up in the faith (vs. 20)
- Pray in the Spirit (vs. 20)
- Keep yourself in the love of God (vs. 21)
- Wait for the mercy of Jesus Christ that leads to life (vs. 21)
- Have mercy on doubters (vs. 22)
- Snatch others from the flames while hating sin (vs. 23)

KNOW: Our own wandering hearts, combined with outside forces working against us, including false prophets, can lead us astray if we are not careful.

DO: Run this race through the finish line!

Questions/Discovery Points for Life Groups/Families

Please read Jude 1-7

- 1. We spoke Sunday about being "beloved" in God. How does that knowledge affect you day to day? Is it hard for you to believe? Why?
- 2. What part of the "faith" was once for all delivered in vs. 3? What general teaching would have been known by all in Jude's day? (see vs. 17 for help)
- 3. How are the teachings of vs. 4 also perpetuated in our own day? Where do we see them?
- 4. Jude recalls history as a warning to his hearers. In what ways has your own history, or the history of some you know, served as a warning to you?
- 5. Today we lean away from graphic warnings as a way of holding people accountable. Why do you think they are so prevalent in Scripture?
- 6. Take time to pray for your own faith this week. Ask God to keep you firmly in it.
