THAT YOU MAY KNOW

A Second Sign John 4:43-54 March 27, 2022

This was now the second sign that Jesus did when he had come from Judea to Galilee - John 4:54

I. ON THE ROAD AGAIN

- Following his mission to Sychar, Jesus returns to Galilee, his adopted homeland (Matt. 2:23; Mark 16:6).
- He is welcomed home, but not everything is as it seems (John 4:48).

II. DESPERATELY SEEKING A SIGN

- Jesus returns to Cana, scene of his first great sign, and is confronted by a desperate man looking for a miracle (Vss. 46-49).
- God often puts us in situations where urgent faith is needed (John 2:4, Mark 5:21-40, 7:27, 9:24).

III. JESUS, THE DIVINE SON OF GOD

- Generally speaking, Jesus heals directly, by word and/or by touch. But he doesn't have to (Vs. 50; Matt. 8:5-13; Mark 7:24-30).
- Virtually all of Jesus' signs involve a numerical detail (e.g. two large stone jars, "I will raise it in three days," a man lame for 38 years, feeding of five thousand). This miracle is no exception—it occurs at the seventh hour (Vs. 52).
- As the Father raises the dead and give them life, so also the Son gives life to whom he will (John 5:21).

IV. BELIEVE

- Thus the "Cana Cycle" comes to an end. Here we see both
 John's gospel theology and Jesus' mission theology come to
 life. John's recorded signs are meant to elicit faith in us, and
 Jesus' mission is ultimately to all people (John 6:28-29; Gal. 3:28).
- Think less about the amount of your faith, and more about the object of your faith (Luke 17:5-6).

KNOW: Faith in Jesus leads to life. Abundant life. It always has. It always will.

DO: Put your faith in Jesus. Take him at his word.
